


2017-2018 11th Grade Summer Reading Assignments

Matched by Ally Condie





Assignment for Summer Reading

Required Assignment:

A Literature Analysis is a writing tool that helps you understand and connect to the texts we read. It should be completed on notebook paper and stapled together to hand in on the first day of school. Each entry should be labeled and about one-page in length. Use the guidelines and sample below to complete your Summer Reading assignment. You must have five (5) entries for each book. (*Tip: Divide the number of pages in the book by 5; one entry should span that number of pages. For example, Fahrenheit 451 has 165 pages. $165/5=33$ pages per entry, give or take.*)

For each Literature Analysis Entry, complete the following tasks:

LABEL: At the top of the page, label the page range for this entry.

1. Write a summary of the section. Your summary needs to be five-eight sentences OR 10 bullet points and must include all key details from the section.
2. Make a connection: You can make connections to your life or other things that you've learned. Your connection must be five-eight sentences long and be specific!
3. Write down one quote that stood out to you. Put it in quotation marks and after the quote, cite the author's last name and the page number in parentheses. After the quote, explain in three-five sentences why the quote stood out to you.

Sample Literature Analysis

"The Three Pigs" (pp. 1-10)

1. **Summary:** This story begins with three pigs living happily in a small village. They all live together in a grassy field, and they have very little to worry about. Unfortunately, an evil wolf moves to town, and he has it in for these pigs. It's unclear why, but word gets around that he is planning to capture and eat the innocent little pigs. The three pigs (who are brothers) each decide to build a new house to protect themselves from the wolf. The first pig decides to build his house out of straw: His task is quick and easy, and he is done in only a few hours. He spends the rest of the day drinking lemonade and watching TV in his straw house while his two brothers work hard on building their own new homes.
2. **Connection:** This section of the story made me think about when we were preparing for Hurricane Sandy. It was scary because we weren't sure when or how the hurricane would hit us. Some people took the threat lightly, like the first pig brother, and really didn't pay attention to the warning to stock up on water bottles and extra flashlights. Those people ended up being lucky, because Philadelphia didn't get hit too hard, but others were left without food or water or power for weeks. Just like the brothers prepared differently for the threat of the wolf, people prepared differently for the hurricane, and for some, it ended badly.
3. **Quote:** "Are you sure that straw is strong enough to keep out the Big Bad Wolf?" (Grimm 7)

I chose this quote because it seems like it's foreshadowing the destruction of this pig's house. It makes me wonder if the author wanted us to worry about this pig's safety, because he chose a weak material to build his house with and the brothers seem concerned.
